"A lot of people have their iPods real loud and don't realise it can be dangerous." she said.

"There is a risk of people going deaf before they are 40 and we don't want that to happen."

sure people are aware of the risk, just making them aware it has long term affects and if they damage their hearing it's permanent," fellow group member Jasmin Prewett added.

The students developed the Community Learning Project last term while taking part in a special nine-week education program at the Alpine School near Dinner Plain Village in the Victorian Alps.

The group was among 45 students selected to participate in the intensive leadership program for year nine students from government schools.

Students from Portland and Brauer College also took part in the program.

Despite no mobile phones, television, iPods or radios allowed in the nine weeks, the teens said the program was a great experience.

"It was great to meet lots of different people from all over Victoria," Jasmin said.

The students were chosen for their potential to be future leaders in their school and participated in a range of activities to develop leadership and presentation skills.
